◆ We have a living room with TV/VCR/DVD, a surround sound speaker system, a full kitchen, a porch, an air hockey table and even a fireplace! Motivated residents can join CLC's Student Executive Board. CLC houses 30 residents - individuals, roommate pairs, and clusters of friends are welcome to apply.

◆ Primary requirements for members living in the CLC are (1) five hours of community service completed on an individual basis per semester, (2) hosting one group social project, one group community awareness project, and one community service event, and (3) attendance at three CLC sponsored programs put on by fellow residents each semester.

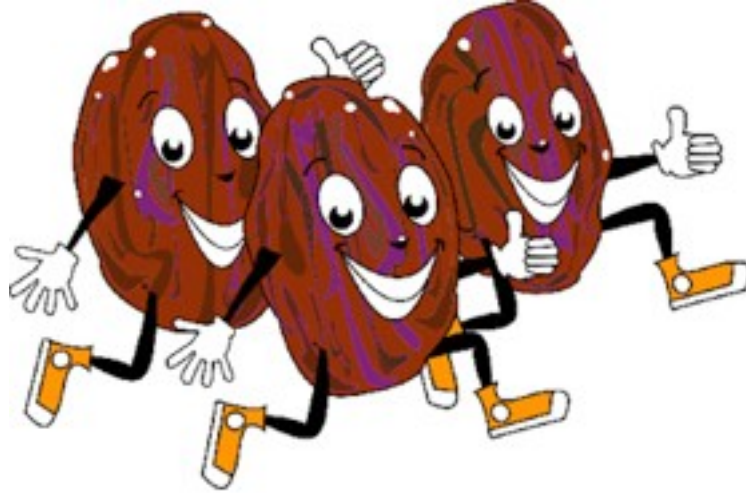
